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"Living on the edge" with Knocknagoney Area Forum




(KAF developed a Winter Emergency Support Plan for vulnerable older people in the area which included the provision of "gritting stations")

The Knocknagoney Area Forum was set up to address the issues in the Knocknagoney, Garnerville and Orchard Court area. The area is located in East Belfast, between the Old Holywood Road and Parkway, and is situated on the edge of Belfast City as it borders North Down Borough. We are close to George Best City Airport and one of the largest Tesco stores in Northern Ireland.

There approximately 1,200 people and 635 households within the area. The area as a whole has a higher than average older population, although there are some parts with a higher than average younger population.

In 2010 East Belfast Community Development Agency commissioned a community consultation and a report was finalised in January 2011. As a response to this report several groups and organisations working in the area formed the Knocknagoney Area Forum. Four working groups were formed to act on the issues arising from the report on the following themes:



The Forum provides opportunities for the local organisations to share information and to work together for the benefit of the area and has already organised a number of joint events for the whole community.

Titanic Yardmen Cycle and Walk – 1st April 2012

Contract Update

Belfast City Council and the Connswater JV (SIAC NI Ltd and Galliford Try Infrastructure) have agreed that it is in both parties' interests to mutually terminate the contract to build the Connswater Community Greenway. Final terms of mutual termination have now been agreed and the Council will be moving to re-start the project. We hope to release details shortly of the revised construction programme.

Community Clean Ups

Following on from a hugely impressive and enjoyable community clean-up in April 2011 local residents, community, CCG and businesses have taken to the Hollow three times since to maintain and further improve the area. The Hollow Cleanups have all been well attended, productive events and could not have taken place without staff and volunteers from Connswater McDonalds, Bloomfield Community Association, Walkway Community Association, East Belfast Alternatives, Pastor Roy from Elim Pentecostal, Belfast City Council, Tidy NI and Linda from Abetta Parade.

Feedback from local residents has been incredibly positive and further interim improvements will take place in the area as a result.





QUB PARC Study Update

The PARC research team has completed the baseline assessment of the project and are currently analysing the data and writing papers. The household surveys (1209 residents participated) and green space observations (Victoria Park, Orangefield Park, Cregagh Glen etc) have been completed. 

POVERTY AND SOCIAL EXCLUSION

Monitoring Poverty and Social Exclusion in Northern Ireland - Joseph Rowntree Foundation

This report updates the 2009 report from the Joseph Rowntree Foundation, written as the recession was hitting Northern Ireland especially hard. Northern Ireland had seen a steeper rise in unemployment than any other part of the UK. Since then, there has been long-term improvement in some areas but persistent problems in others. Here are some of the key findings:



The previous report in this series came out in the depths of the recession in 2009, when Northern Ireland had seen a significant rise in worklessness. The outlook was bleak. This report shows that while things have not got much better, they have not got much worse. Northern Ireland is, like much of Great Britain, in a pause after the very worst of the recession but before the public sector cuts have really begun. Lay Health Information Workers visit Parliament Buildings

Eight Lay Health Information Workers met up with Michael Copeland, Castlereagh Councillor and Member of the Legislative Assembly on Thursday 22 March at Stormont buildings. During the two-hour meeting there were a lot of personal stories shared as well as discussion on a number of important issues. These included how to improve communication between the community and the health authorities about the introduction of campaigns like Bowel Screening. Also discussed was the need to improve communication over personal Patient Care Pathways and placing greater value on engaging local volunteers to take an active part in support and prevention programmes.

Michael highlighted that the priority health issues faced in his constituency office are mental health and post traumatic stress disorder and he made the link with changes to the social security system. Some personal stories of how the system failed individuals were shared but the meeting provided mutual understanding and a shared recognition of the complex relationship between health, relationship breakdown and unemployment in the district of East Belfast that is often viewed as well off.

He also congratulated the Lay Health Workers on their commitment to sign posting services to local people and for raising their concerns and issues. SOCIAL INVESTMENT FUND

Social Investment Fund Update

The Northern Ireland Executive agreed on 22 March 2011 to the establishment of the Social Investment Fund (SIF) and monies totalling £80million over a four year period were subsequently allocated in the Budget. The high level aim of the Social Investment Fund is to reduce poverty, unemployment and physical deterioration in areas through area based interventions of significant scale which will be delivered in partnership with communities.

Following consideration of the issues emerging from the consultation final proposals on the operation of the Fund were brought to the Executive and agreed on 17 May 2012. The Fund will operate across nine Social Investment Zones with a Steering Group consisting of Community/Voluntary, Political, Statutory and Business representation established in each zone, to develop a strategic area plan.

Social Investment Zones

There will be nine zones in total, four in Belfast (Assembly constituencies), one in Derry/Londonderry and four others aligned to the Health and Social Care Trust & Children and Young People Strategic Partnership boundaries.

Steering Group Membership

Each Investment Zone will have a Steering Group to oversee and manage the area planning process, including engaging the wider community to identify evidence and prioritise needs and associated interventions for inclusion in the area plan. There will be a maximum of 14 representatives on each Steering Group who will be selected as follows:

Community and Voluntary

Officials will hold advertised public meetings at which everyone would be informed of the opportunity to submit nominations. All groups held on databases would be notified of the meetings and the timescales involved. The purpose of the meetings will be to outline the parameters for submitting nominations. Officials will consider and provide advice to Ministers who will then make the final decision. Ministers will see the full list of nominations in each zone. There will be a maximum of 4 community and voluntary reps per Steering Group.

Political

Officials will carry out an analysis of the elected representatives per zone and apply the D'Hondt method to determine political party membership. The Party will then decide who should sit on the Steering Group and whether it be an MLA or councillor. There will be a maximum of 4 political representatives per Steering Group.

Statutory

Officials will identify key statutory organisations for each zone and invite them to submit a nomination. Officials will consider and provide advice to Ministers who will then make the final decision. There will be a maximum of 4 statutory representatives per Steering Group and they will be expected to be at a senior level and have the authority to make decisions. There will also be flexibility for rotation of membership or to bring in a specific member for a temporary period when required on a particular issue.

Business

Officials will identify key business organisations and approach them for representation. There will be a maximum of 2 business representatives per Steering Group.

Eligibility

Areas will be expected to propose interventions based on objective evidenced need. Current Multiple Deprivation Measures do not always sufficiently measure rural and spatial deprivation against the 4 themes of SIF.

The eligibility is therefore as follows:

Areas within the top 10% most deprived Super Output Areas on the Multiple Deprivation Measure 2010.

 $Areas\ within\ the\ top\ 20\%\ most\ deprived\ Super\ Output\ Areas\ on\ the\ key\ domains\ of\ income,\ employment,\ education\ and\ health.$

Areas which can provide independently verified and robust evidence of objective need linked to the 4 strategic objectives of SIF.

TATE OF THE SECTOR


State of the Sector VI launched

State of the Sector VI, produced by NICVA, is the latest edition in the State of the Sector research programme which dates back to 1997. The publication of each edition of State of the Sector represents another step in the evolution of this type of statistical analysis and, as such, adds to the already broad and in depth knowledge of the sector by examining many of the key issues currently affecting and shaping it.

State of the Sector VI provides high level statistics on the various types of resources available to the sector and the relationship between voluntary and community organisations, government, funders and the general public. The report can be downloaded from www.nicva.org.

Some key findings:

- There are approximately 4,836 voluntary and community sector organisations in Northern Ireland.
- The main source of funding income is from central government (34.2%), followed by the general public through charitable giving (29.7%), and a range of non-departmental public bodies and statutory agencies (17.4%).
- With regard to the major sub-sectors that form the overall voluntary and community sector in Northern Ireland, 'community development' (15%) and 'children and families' (14%) are very much to the fore
- The top five most popular charitable causes are religious organisations, children and young people, medical research, health and disaster relief.



COMMUNITY PLANNING TOOLKIT All you need, wherever you are.

A new online toolkit was today launched to help Northern Ireland communities and Government work together to build a better future for local people.

Environment Minister Alex Attwood launched the new online Community Planning toolkit - developed by Community Places - at an event in BBC Blackstaff Studios in Belfast.

online Toolkit is available www.communityplanningtoolkit.org and is a comprehensive resource for Community Planning, a process that encourages public bodies and community organisations to work together to plan and provide better services for local people.

The toolkit will help communities across Northern Ireland build stronger relationships gain and understanding of the Community Planning process which will be introduced as part of the restructuring of local councils.

Toolkit, Launching the Environment Minister Alex Attwood said: "I am introducing community planning as part of the reform of local government. It will provide a framework within which Councils, government departments, statutory bodies, and other relevant agencies and sectors can work together to develop and implement a shared vision for promoting the well-being of their area.

"It is based on engagement with the community and will ensure that citizens

have a more effective input into decisions highlights and directs users to useful tools, that will affect them. The online Toolkit launched today is a combination of research, information, advice and best practice gathered together in one place. It will provide a valuable resource to all those involved in community planning across Northern Ireland."

Speaking at the Toolkit launch, Colm Bradley, Director of Community Places, said: "Community Planning is now firmly on the agenda and the public sector and communities across the region have a unique opportunity to work together to improve services and the quality of life in local communities."

continued: "The Programme Government has confirmed an 11 Council model and legislation for boundary changes has been presented to the Assembly.

"The pace of change is increasing and Community Planning is at the heart of this process. This online Toolkit, developed with funding from a learning contract awarded by the Big Lottery Fund, is an important resource that will help all communities understand and get involved in Community Planning so that better services and opportunities are developed for local people.

The Toolkit explores the key themes which are essential for effective Community Planning Practice including, Community Engagement and Working Together and

resources, case studies and podcasts.

It is is a valuable resource for all organisations interested and involved in Community Planning.

Commenting on the new Toolkit, Joanne McDowell, Big Lottery Fund NI Director, said: "Changes in the public sector in Northern Ireland will affect the way services for local communities are delivered. Community planning is an important part of this change and the Big Lottery Fund wanted to ensure voluntary and community sector bodies and groups had a resource to learn from this engagement process.

"The new online toolkit developed by Community Places is an important resource to help local people and organisations understand, learn about and get involved in this process so they can help to plan and shape services in their communities."

The framework, produced by EBCDA is now available from our offices or online at <u>www.ebcda.org</u>.

it offers a joined up vision for the future of East Belfast. Achieved through refocusing the skills, awareness, knowledge and experience of community development workers, the voluntary sector and the statutory sector to empower local people to speak and act on their own behalf and provide a framework that enables local groups o participate more widely in society.

The purpose of the Community Development Framework is to provide a document which contains principles that organisations can sign up to in terms of the delivery of community development in East Belfast.

As part of the underpinning process, of making the framework a success, organisations have agreed to have their names included in the document as being in support of the framework.

"We set out on a cold, wet morning for our tour of the Titanic Quarter and were immediately transported back to the old days as we boarded the double-decker bus. The tour took us down to the new Titanic building where we caught a glimpse of Samson and Goliath. Then, on down the Queen's Road to the time keeping office. The guide Ashleen kept us well informed of the history and the antics of the shipyard men. We saw the magnificent Drawing Office where the Titanic and so many great ships were planned and the enormous Paint Hall now bringing in money as a film studio.

After a quick look at HMS Caroline we reached the Thompson Dock, and in spite of the rain and cold we stood in awe as it brought home to us the size of Titanic and the skilled workmen who built the dock. The Pump House was another awesome experience and again we were made to appreciate the skills of the men, especially the Belfast-men who worked and planned, through a short film presentation.

Digital Outreach is working to make sure that everyone in the area is ready for the big switch to digital TV on 24th October 2012. Over the next few months there will be lots of information in the press about how to get ready for switchover – we will be helping to cascade the key messages throughout East Belfast.

Key points to note;

- If you are watching five channels or fewer- you will need to convert your TV to digital
- You don't have to buy a new TV, almost all set can be converted with a digital box
- There is help available for older people and those less able to cope
