Our job this year has been made slightly easier by having our strategy for 2006-2010 "From Challenge to Change" and has allowed us to manage our work within a proper context. Our operational plan for 2006 has complemented our strategy and has ensured that we achieve all that we laid out in our Strategy and so has acted as our "true north". The everchanging environment for the Community Sector has of course brought its challenges for us as well and will continue to do so in the coming years but we will meet these challenges with confidence.

Director's Report

This has been another exciting, although challenging year for EBCDA. With big changes afoot in the funding environment and the full implementation of Neighbourhood Renewal, this has meant big changes for the community sector throughout Northern Ireland and obviously we see the manifestation of this in East Belfast. Despite this changing environment, we have continued to provide our core support services for the Community Sector in East Belfast and have continually developed new ideas and opportunities for the sector in East Belfast.

Local Community Fund

This year we concluded the third and final year of the Local Community Fund (LCF) for Inner East. We acted as agents for CFNI/DSD in administering over £460,000 involving local community groups and schools. It also saw the start of a new element of the LCF which targets the 10%-20% most deprived communities in N.I. This has resulted in approx £86,000 being made available for groups and schools in parts of Island Ward,

Bloomfield Ward and Sydenham Ward and we have managed this again on behalf of CFNI/DSD.

Conference 2006



Our conference this which vear. was organised between Belfast City Council, Castlereagh Borough Council and EBCDA, continued with the theme of "change" and targeted

areas in East Belfast and Castlereagh that are outside the Neighbourhood Renewal areas of Inner East and Tullycarnet.

The conference was held in CFC Church and included guest speakers and workshops and was attended by 62 people from the community sector.

The conference was the first stage in developing work with groups in these areas that will hopefully lead to them not becoming the most deprived communities in East Belfast in the future, so this will form part of our work in 2007.

Networking Centre



2006 we Early in began the process of looking at the possibility of developing the old Templemore Avenue School into а **Networking Centre for**

East Belfast. East Belfast Partnership assisted in sourcing the funding that allowed us to commission Community Technical Aid (CTA) to produce a report that would give us an idea of costs and concepts for the building.

We worked with a number of groups who we thought would be interested in being involved in the project.

It will take approx 3 years to realise a fully functional networking centre and £3-5 million, but would be a worth-while development for the sector in East Belfast.



Networking and Advocacy

In 2006 we represented a view from the sector in East Belfast to the wider environment in Northern Ireland. We did this by developing and maintaining contact with MLAs, Councillors, MP, BCC, Inner East Forum, E B Partnership, Castlereagh Council, NICVA, S&E Health & Social Care Group, Community Development Networks Forum, Inner East Neighbourhood Partnership, Co-Operation Ireland, DSD/BRO and Minister Hanson.

Community Resource and Finance Services

Within the Resource Department we continue to offer the following services – photocopying (including colour copying), typing, laminating, collating and binding.

One of the growing sections we have found to be is that of information sharing. We have over 300 groups and they have provided us with their email address which enables us to forward, in a short period of time, any relevant information that might be of interest to them. Our meeting room, now that we have new tables and a full multimedia system, has also seen an increase in use.

Within our Finance Department we continue to provide payroll services, independent examinations and finance advice. We have, as part of the Committees Embracing Change Programme, worked with some groups in developing and adapting a Finance Policy for their Organisation.

We also make all our written policies available to the sector in East Belfast for adaptation and reference purposes. These policies include:-

- Health & Safety
- Staff Handbook (detailing conditions of employment)
- Finance Policy
- Anti-fraud


Our biggest piece of work this year was the final stages of administration the Local Community Fund 2005/2006. The budget for the fund was broken down as follows:-

- - £43,430 5 schools
- - £335,250 30 groups (main grant)
- £36,414 14 groups (small grant)

Community Resource and Finance Services continue to provide administration and financial management for EBCDA, as well as managing the building and services related to this.




Breakdown of Community Resource & Finance Services used by Groups



FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The Agency's total income for 2005/2006 was £543,429 and total expenditure was £494,516. Therefore income exceeded expenditure by £48,913. The following graphs show where our money came from and how it was spent. A full set of our accounts can be obtained from the offices of EBCDA.

Community Support/Capacity Building

This year has seen the Community Support Programme move into its fourth year and continues to develop groups in East Belfast, support their work, provide a range of networking and training opportunities and encourage capacity building through the provision of various baseline services.

Support, Advice and Resources

We have continued to provide support to groups through assistance with sourcing funding, completing application forms, setting up as a new group, registering as a charity, managing projects. Several Organisations have had support to access grant-tracker and I also developed two new sections for our Community Advice Pack – the first outlining the issue of insurance and the second providing information to assist in completing funding applications.

Involvement in various working partnerships has led to EBCDA helping to implement a wide range of events and community activity, for example: rolling out the Arterial Routes Scheme, Streetreach 2006 and a Community Health Fair in Avoniel Leisure Centre, and I was pleased to be involved in so many excellent and worthwhile projects.

Networking

We have continued to facilitate range of а opportunities networking throughout the vear. including the Community Forum, Workers' Youth Workers' Forum and the



Social Economy Stakeholders' Forum all of which are increasingly growing from strength to strength.

We also began a series of 'information and networking' events to provide workers and volunteers with an opportunity to learn more about the issues that affect them in their work and to share information about their work in East Belfast. The first event saw teams of community workers competing against each other in W5 challenges, and the second involved speed networking where all participants agreed that the exercise had been of great value but that they had definitely earned their tea and coffee!

Information and Training

Email, our newssheet, and the clash diary, produced quarterly, have been packed with details about community organisations' events, projects, opinions and successes.

A major programme we have developed and managed this Committees Embracing been the vear has Change Belfast Programme, funded under City Council's Neighbourhood Economic Development Programme. management committees have participated in an extensive range of training modules including Using the Media, Using PQASSO - a Practical Quality Assurance System for Small Organisations. Professional Financial Management, Developing a Long-term Financial Strategy, The Changing Community Sector and many others.

The programme was designed to encourage committees to be better prepared to manage their Organisations and was put together in response to Government's Positive Steps



document which said "we will increasingly require evidence quality standards as prefunding requisite for support; will put in we place mechanisms to

check that systems of governance and accountability are sufficient and adequate for the disbursement of public money". Participants have been very positive about the programme which is due to finish in March 2007.

Other training organised this year included 'Understanding and Using NINIS', 'First Aid at Work', and a challenging 'Women into Politics' workshop.

Health & Social Connections Programme

It has been one year since the Health & Social Connections Programme began. It has been a year of getting to know communities, people, and the organisations they work for and also finding out the lay of the land in terms of health improvement work in East Belfast. Contact has also been made with a wide range of community, voluntary and statutory stakeholders around the theme of health and well-being improvement. Furthermore a Programme Advisory Group has been established and has met three times to-date.

Health Audit Report


One of the core objectives in the first year was to produce a mapping report which reflected existing health activity across East Belfast and Castlereagh.

Whilst the research took a bit longer than expected to complete we received an excellent response from workers and organisations respectively, which in turn has provided EBCDA with the information to inform the Health Audit Report.

It was an interesting piece of research to undertake due to the fact that people on the ground referred to health initiatives they were involved in such as healthy eating, cancer awareness and exercise classes.

Primarily these have an impact on our health, but if we look a little deeper we realize that there are various other

determinants which impact on our health such as access to education, access to affordable housing, the ability to develop our skills. One of the main aims of the programme over the



coming year therefore is to enable community workers to make the 'connections' between the work that they do and how this assists in reducing health inequalities in their local communities.

Woodstock Ethnic Minority Support Network

I have represented EBCDA on the above network over the past year and was actively involved in the collation of its Ethnic Minority Welcome Pack. The network exists to identify and address issues specific to all black/ethnic minorities living and working within East Belfast eg English language classes, access to advice and information, and health services.

Networking

Over the past year I have facilitated 3 health information sessions, attended 3 conferences and numerous other networking/information sharing events.



I currently represent EBCDA on the SEBT/Investing for Health Mental Health Community of Interest. More recently I was invited to sit on the Community Development Health Networks 'Building the Community/Pharmacy Partnership'.

This has been an excellent opportunity to network with statutory workers and to gain a better understanding of how better to influence policy development at a Government level.

I'd like to say thank you for your support in developing the Health Connections Programme and my thanks to all the staff at EBCDA for making me feel so welcome, and also to all the respondents of the Health Mapping Exercise who kindly completed the lengthy questionnaire.
